Post Collision Check List for Drivers

- 1. Turn off engine and on 4-way flashers, set out flares or reflectors.
- 2. Remain at the scene and check for immediate danger, such as fuel spills, hazmat, fires etc. Ensure your personal safety and safety of others.
- 3. Ensure that seriously injured parties are cared for. If necessary, call an ambulance.
- 4. Notify the police immediately by calling 911 and advise of damages and injuries.
- 5. Collect as much information from the scene of the incident. Be prepared to provide a contact phone number, the location of the incident, a brief description of the incident, any spills and related damages to all vehicles and cargo.
- **6.** Notify your employer, call dispatch with the details.
- 7. Ensure that vehicles are in a SAFE POSITION
 - (i) **Do not move a vehicle** after an accident until police arrive **UNLESS** the position of the vehicle makes another accident likely, even with triangles and flares. Use good judgment in move
 - (ii) UNLESS NEEDED FOR SAFETY REASONS, DO NOT MOVE UNTIL COORDINATED WITH RECONSTRUCTION EXPERT

8. IF MOVE VEHICLES BEFORE POLICE ARRIVE

- (i)Photograph vehicles with reference to locations **before** they are moved (show vehicles and reference objects so can reconstruct location later)
- (ii) Try to mark location of vehicle before it's moved
- (iii) Try to chart location before move
- -on diagram
- -relation to landmarks/sides of road
- -distances to objects (paces, etc.)
- 9. Have witness cards filled out by anyone who saw the accident.
- 10. Take pictures of the scene, if possible. Do not take photographs of the victims and injured parties under any circumstances.
- 11. Do not discuss the accident with anybody except the police, company or insurance representative.
- 12. DONOT ADMIT FAULT or Liability to anyone. You are not required to give a statement to the police but do cooperate with them and provide them with the documents they require.

- 13. Complete the as much possible information of the accident report at the scene of the accident.
- 14. Submit this report to your safety Personnel as soon as possible. This report is for internal use only and do not distribute or copy this report to others.
- 15. When you have been cleared to leave, be sure you are both physically and mentally prepared to continue.
